## Description

The field of security and public and private investigations is a growing one and law enforcement investigative methods and techniques have undergone significant changes in recent years. This innovative and dynamic online certificate program is designed for those employed in the private and/or public sector and will increase student's legal knowledge and investigative skills.

## Program Learning Outcomes

The graduate has reliably demonstrated the ability to:

1. identify and explain the essential components of preparing relevant investigative reports;
2. examine the complex nature of white collar crime and identify the challenges that face law enforcement in dealing with both the crime and the criminals;
3. describe the role of computers in committing criminal offences and the movement and storage of digital information on the internet;
4. explain the criminal offences of Defamatory Libel, unauthorized use of a computer, and threatening;
5. identify different types of evidence, including DNA, and their value to solving a crime;
6. apply the proper method of managing a crime scene from arrival to the conclusion of the final investigation;
7. explain the role and interaction of morality, ethics, and human behaviour as they relate to law enforcement professionals;
8. identify different types of offences and the evidence required to obtain a conviction in a court of law;
9. outline the difference between civil law and criminal law and privacy laws and how these differences affect the investigation and prosecution of crimes;
10. examine and organize evidence by applying deductive reasoning to eliminate or support particular theories;

11. identify, examine, interpret, and apply collision evidence collection techniques in explaining the series of events in a motor vehicle collision;
12. employ environmentally sustainable practices within the profession.

## Admission Requirements

- Grade 12 English (C or U)
